
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But, what can I eat?


Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread are almost upon us! Spring begins Yahweh's New Year. It's warmer and we look forward to seeing leaves appear on the trees and flowers blooming everywhere. The Feast of Unleavened Bread is extra special because we deep clean our homes and get rid of anything containing leavening agents. So, what are leavening agents, exactly? Leavening agents cause a fermentation reaction when added to dough to cause rapid expansion, thereby "puffing up" baked items. Think soft fluffy bread, moist muffins, and yummy sweet cakes.

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Several thousand years ago, the Israelites were under bondage in Egypt, the superpower of their day. Yahweh brought them out so quickly with His Mighty Hand, that their bread did not even have time to rise. And so we observe the spring Holy Days annually to remember this powerful event. For seven days we eat unleavened bread, known as *matzah* in the Hebrew. But is that all we are allowed to eat for seven days? No need to worry. We still have lots of choices. Fruits, veggies, most cereals, rice, dairy products, unbreaded meats,



poultry, and clean fish are all good options. Your mom will most likely also be baking unleavened items such as bread, crackers, cookies without any added leavening agents.

Passover is also very important. It commemorates the final plague when Yahweh inflicted the death of the firstborn on the Egyptians and the death angel "passed over" the lamb's blood-marked homes of the Israelites, thus sparing their firstborn. Most importantly, Yahshua is our Passover. He suffered and died for our sins, wiping our slates clean when we accept His perfect sacrifice in our lives. May you be abundantly blessed this spring as you observe Yahweh's Holy Days.

HOUSE

The Hebrew word for “house” is “beit.” It soundslike “bay-it.”

In Ancient Hebrew the letter “B” looks like:  (a floor plan of a house or tent). It stands for the words: House, Within, Family.

The next Ancient Hebrew letter “I” or “Y” looks like:  (an extended arm with an open hand). It stands for the words: Work, Throw, Worship.

The last Ancient Hebrew letter “T” looks like:  (two crossed sticks). It stands for the words: Covenant, Signal, Monument or Mark.

To make the word “house,” the three letters are written together like this:  . In Hebrew, words are read from right to left – just the opposite of English words.

So, what is the place that a family works together with the Covenant (a set of rules) called? HOUSE!

Almost all Hebrew words are made with letters that are arranged so as to define or explain each word!
